DEFINITE AND INDEFINITE INTEGRALS

INDEFINITE INTEGRALS

$$\int_a^b f(x) \, dx = F(b) - F(a)$$

This formula is derived from the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus, which links differentiation and integration. The result of a definite integral yields a numerical value representing the total area under the curve from $x = a$ to $x = b$, accounting for areas above the x -axis as positive and areas below as negative.

METHODS FOR CALCULATING AREA

METHODS CAN PROVIDE GOOD APPROXIMATIONS. TWO WIDELY USED NUMERICAL TECHNIQUES ARE:

TRAPEZOIDAL RULE

THE TRAPEZOIDAL RULE ESTIMATES THE AREA UNDER A CURVE BY DIVIDING THE INTERVAL $[a, b]$ INTO n SUBINTERVALS OF EQUAL WIDTH AND APPROXIMATING THE AREA UNDER THE CURVE WITH TRAPEZOIDS. THE FORMULA CAN BE EXPRESSED AS:

$$A \approx (b - a)/n [f(a) + 2\sum f(x_i) + f(b)]$$

WHERE x_i ARE THE ENDPOINTS OF EACH SUBINTERVAL. THIS METHOD IS EFFECTIVE FOR FUNCTIONS THAT ARE REASONABLY LINEAR OVER SMALL INTERVALS.

SIMPSON'S RULE

SIMPSON'S RULE PROVIDES A MORE ACCURATE APPROXIMATION THAN THE TRAPEZOIDAL RULE BY USING PARABOLIC SEGMENTS TO ESTIMATE THE AREA. THE FORMULA FOR SIMPSON'S RULE IS AS FOLLOWS:

$$A \approx (b - a)/(3n) [f(a) + 4\sum f(x_i) + 2\sum f(x_i)]$$

WHERE THE SUMS INVOLVE EVALUATING THE FUNCTION AT VARIOUS POINTS WITHIN THE INTERVAL. THIS METHOD IS PARTICULARLY USEFUL FOR SMOOTH FUNCTIONS.
