

# BENZENE IN ORGANIC CHEMISTRY

THIS DELOCALIZATION IS RESPONSIBLE FOR BENZENE'S UNIQUE PROPERTIES, INCLUDING ITS UNIFORM BOND LENGTHS AND ANGLES. THE RESONANCE STRUCTURE CAN BE REPRESENTED AS:

- SINGLE BONDS BETWEEN CARBON ATOMS.
- DOUBLE BONDS ALTERNATING WITH SINGLE BONDS.
- A CIRCLE INDICATING ELECTRON DELOCALIZATION.

THIS RESONANCE STABILIZATION CONTRIBUTES TO BENZENE'S LOWER REACTIVITY COMPARED TO ALKENES, MAKING IT A KEY COMPOUND IN ORGANIC CHEMISTRY.

# PROPERTIES OF BENZENE

BENZENE POSSESSES SEVERAL NOTEWORTHY PROPERTIES THAT SET IT APART FROM OTHER HYDROCARBONS. THESE PROPERTIES ARISE FROM ITS UNIQUE STRUCTURE AND THE NATURE OF ITS BONDS.

## PHYSICAL PROPERTIES

AS A COLORLESS LIQUID AT ROOM TEMPERATURE, BENZENE HAS A SWEET ODOR AND IS HIGHLY VOLATILE. ITS BOILING POINT IS APPROXIMATELY  $80.1^{\circ}\text{C}$ , AND IT HAS A MELTING POINT OF ABOUT  $5.5^{\circ}\text{C}$ . DUE TO ITS NON-POLAR NATURE, BENZENE IS LESS SOLUBLE IN WATER BUT DISSOLVES WELL IN ORGANIC SOLVENTS.

## CHEMICAL PROPERTIES

CHEMICALLY, BENZENE IS CHARACTERIZED BY ITS RESISTANCE TO ADDITION REACTIONS, WHICH ARE COMMON IN ALKENES. INSTEAD, BENZENE UNDERGOES SUBSTITUTION REACTIONS, WHERE HYDROGEN ATOMS ARE REPLACED BY OTHER ATOMS OR GROUPS. THIS BEHAVIOR IS ATTRIBUTED TO ITS STABLE AROMATIC SYSTEM, WHICH IS MAINTAINED DURING THESE REACTIONS.

## REACTIVITY OF BENZENE

THE REACTIVITY OF BENZENE IS A CENTRAL TOPIC IN ORGANIC CHEMISTRY, PARTICULARLY CONCERNING ELECTROPHILIC AROMATIC SUBSTITUTION (EAS) REACTIONS. UNDERSTANDING HOW BENZENE REACTS IS VITAL FOR SYNTHESIZING VARIOUS ORGANIC COMPOUNDS.

## ELECTROPHILIC AROMATIC SUBSTITUTION

BENZENE REACTS WITH ELECTROPHILES THROUGH A MECHANISM KNOWN AS ELECTROPHILIC AROMATIC SUBSTITUTION. IN THIS PROCESS, AN ELECTROPHILE ATTACKS THE BENZENE RING, TEMPORARILY DISRUPTING ITS AROMATICITY BEFORE A HYDROGEN ATOM IS EXPELLED. COMMON ELECTROPHILES INCLUDE:

- NITRONIUM ION ( $\text{NO}_2^+$ )
- CARBOCATIONS ( $\text{R}^+$ )
- HALOGENS ( $\text{Br}_2$ ,  $\text{Cl}_2$  WITH A CATALYST)
- SULFONIUM IONS ( $\text{SO}_3\text{H}$ )

THIS MECHANISM ALLOWS FOR THE INTRODUCTION OF VARIOUS FUNCTIONAL GROUPS ONTO THE BENZENE RING, LEADING TO THE FORMATION OF SUBSTITUTED BENZENES.

## COMMON REACTIONS

SOME NOTABLE REACTIONS INVOLVING BENZENE INCLUDE:

- NITRATION: CONVERSION OF BENZENE TO NITROBENZENE USING NITRIC ACID.
- HALOGENATION: FORMATION OF HALOBENZENES THROUGH REACTIONS WITH HALOGENS.
- SULFONATION: INTRODUCTION OF SULFONIC ACID GROUPS TO FORM SULFONIC ACIDS.

THESE REACTIONS ARE FUNDAMENTAL IN SYNTHETIC ORGANIC CHEMISTRY AND INDUSTRIAL APPLICATIONS.

## SYNTHESIS OF BENZENE

### LABORATORY SYNTHESIS

IN LABORATORY SETTINGS, BENZENE CAN BE SYNTHESIZED THROUGH:

- DECARBOXYLATION OF SODIUM BENZOATE WITH SODA LIME.
- REDUCTION OF PHENOL USING ZINC DUST.
- WURTZ REACTION: COUPLING OF ALKYL HALIDES.

THESE METHODS ALLOW CHEMISTS TO PRODUCE BENZENE AS NEEDED FOR VARIOUS EXPERIMENTS AND APPLICATIONS.

## APPLICATIONS OF BENZENE
