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INTRODUCTION TO ALKENES

ALKENES ARE DEFINED AS UNSATURATED HYDROCARBONS CONTAINING AT LEAST ONE CARBON-CARBON DOUBLE BOND ($C=C$). THIS DOUBLE BOND INTRODUCES UNIQUE CHEMICAL PROPERTIES THAT DIFFERENTIATE ALKENES FROM ALKANES, WHICH CONTAIN ONLY SINGLE BONDS. THE SIMPLEST ALKENE, ETHYLENE (C_2H_4), SERVES AS A FOUNDATIONAL COMPOUND IN ORGANIC CHEMISTRY AND INDUSTRY.

ALKENES CAN BE CLASSIFIED BASED ON THE NUMBER OF DOUBLE BONDS THEY CONTAIN. COMPOUNDS WITH ONE DOUBLE BOND ARE TERMED ALKENES, WHILE THOSE WITH MULTIPLE DOUBLE BONDS ARE KNOWN AS POLYENES. THE PRESENCE OF DOUBLE BONDS MAKES ALKENES HIGHLY REACTIVE, LEADING TO VARIOUS CHEMICAL REACTIONS THAT ARE FUNDAMENTAL IN ORGANIC SYNTHESIS.

UNDERSTANDING ALKENES IS ESSENTIAL FOR STUDENTS AND PROFESSIONALS IN CHEMISTRY, AS THEY ARE PIVOTAL IN THE PRODUCTION OF PLASTICS, PHARMACEUTICALS, AND MANY OTHER IMPORTANT MATERIALS.

STRUCTURE AND NOMENCLATURE OF ALKENES

THE STRUCTURE OF ALKENES IS DEFINED BY THE ARRANGEMENT OF CARBON ATOMS AND THE PRESENCE OF DOUBLE BONDS. THE GENERAL FORMULA FOR ALKENES IS C_nH_{2n} , WHERE n IS THE NUMBER OF CARBON ATOMS.

GEOMETRIC ISOMERISM

ONE INTERESTING ASPECT OF ALKENES IS GEOMETRIC ISOMERISM, WHICH OCCURS DUE TO THE RESTRICTED ROTATION AROUND THE CARBON-CARBON DOUBLE BOND. THE TWO TYPES OF GEOMETRIC ISOMERS ARE:

- **CIS ISOMERS:** THE SUBSTITUENTS ON THE DOUBLE-BONDED CARBONS ARE ON THE SAME SIDE.
- **TRANS ISOMERS:** THE SUBSTITUENTS ARE ON OPPOSITE SIDES OF THE DOUBLE BOND.

THESE ISOMERS EXHIBIT DIFFERENT PHYSICAL AND CHEMICAL PROPERTIES, WHICH CAN SIGNIFICANTLY INFLUENCE THEIR REACTIVITY AND APPLICATIONS.

NOMENCLATURE RULES

THE INTERNATIONAL UNION OF PURE AND APPLIED CHEMISTRY (IUPAC) PROVIDES SYSTEMATIC RULES FOR NAMING ALKENES. THE KEY STEPS INCLUDE:

1. IDENTIFY THE LONGEST CARBON CHAIN THAT CONTAINS THE DOUBLE BOND.
2. NUMBER THE CARBON ATOMS IN THE CHAIN, STARTING FROM THE END CLOSEST TO THE DOUBLE BOND.
3. USE THE SUFFIX “-ENE” TO DENOTE THE PRESENCE OF A DOUBLE BOND AND SPECIFY THE POSITION OF THE DOUBLE BOND WITH A NUMBER.

FOR EXAMPLE, 1-BUTENE INDICATES A FOUR-CARBON ALKENE WITH THE DOUBLE BOND BETWEEN THE FIRST AND SECOND CARBON ATOMS.

PHYSICAL PROPERTIES OF ALKENES

ALKENES EXHIBIT DISTINCT PHYSICAL PROPERTIES THAT ARE INFLUENCED BY THEIR MOLECULAR STRUCTURE.

BOILING AND MELTING POINTS

THE BOILING AND MELTING POINTS OF ALKENES GENERALLY INCREASE WITH MOLECULAR WEIGHT. ALKENES ARE TYPICALLY LESS DENSE THAN WATER AND ARE INSOLUBLE IN WATER, BUT THEY ARE SOLUBLE IN ORGANIC SOLVENTS.

REACTIVITY AND STABILITY

THE PRESENCE OF THE DOUBLE BOND IN ALKENES CONTRIBUTES TO THEIR REACTIVITY. ALKENES ARE MORE REACTIVE THAN ALKANES DUE TO THE ELECTRON-RICH NATURE OF THE DOUBLE BOND. THIS REACTIVITY IS KEY IN VARIOUS CHEMICAL REACTIONS, INCLUDING ADDITION REACTIONS, POLYMERIZATION, AND OXIDATION.

CHEMICAL REACTIONS OF ALKENES

ALKENES UNDERGO SEVERAL TYPES OF CHEMICAL REACTIONS, PRIMARILY DUE TO THE REACTIVITY OF THE CARBON-CARBON DOUBLE BOND.

ADDITION REACTIONS

ADDITION REACTIONS INVOLVE THE ADDITION OF ATOMS OR GROUPS ACROSS THE DOUBLE BOND. COMMON TYPES OF ADDITION REACTIONS INCLUDE:

- **HYDROGENATION:** THE ADDITION OF HYDROGEN (H_2) TO AN ALKENE, CONVERTING IT INTO AN ALKANE.
- **HALOGENATION:** THE ADDITION OF HALOGENS (E.G., Cl_2 , Br_2), RESULTING IN VICINAL DIHALIDES.
- **HYDRATION:** THE ADDITION OF WATER, OFTEN IN THE PRESENCE OF AN ACID, TO FORM ALCOHOLS.

THESE REACTIONS ARE SIGNIFICANT IN ORGANIC SYNTHESIS AND INDUSTRIAL PROCESSES.
