

DIAMOND CHEMISTRY FORMULA

CUBIC CRYSTAL SYSTEM

DIAMONDS CRYSTALLIZE IN THE CUBIC CRYSTAL SYSTEM, WHICH IS ONE OF THE MOST SYMMETRICAL STRUCTURES FOUND IN

NATURE. THIS CUBIC ARRANGEMENT CONTRIBUTES TO THE DIAMOND'S EXCEPTIONAL OPTICAL PROPERTIES, INCLUDING ITS ABILITY TO DISPERSE LIGHT INTO VARIOUS COLORS, RESULTING IN THE WELL-KNOWN SPARKLE OF DIAMONDS.

IMPURITIES AND VARIATIONS

WHILE PURE DIAMONDS CONSIST SOLELY OF CARBON ATOMS, MANY NATURAL DIAMONDS CONTAIN TRACE AMOUNTS OF OTHER ELEMENTS, LEADING TO VARIATIONS IN COLOR AND OTHER PHYSICAL PROPERTIES. COMMON IMPURITIES INCLUDE:

NATURAL VS. SYNTHETIC DIAMONDS

NATURAL DIAMONDS

NATURAL DIAMONDS ARE FORMED FROM CARBON SOURCES SUBJECTED TO EXTREME GEOLOGICAL CONDITIONS. THE PROCESS INVOLVES CARBON ATOMS CRYSTALLIZING OVER LONG PERIODS, RESULTING IN THE FORMATION OF DIAMONDS DEEP WITHIN THE

SYNTHETIC DIAMONDS

SYNTHETIC DIAMONDS, ALSO KNOWN AS LAB-GROWN DIAMONDS, ARE PRODUCED USING TECHNIQUES SUCH AS HIGH PRESSURE HIGH TEMPERATURE (HPHT) AND CHEMICAL VAPOR DEPOSITION (CVD). APPLICATIONS OF DIAMONDS IN VARIOUS INDUSTRIES
