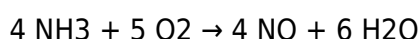

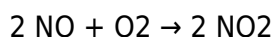
Ostwald Process

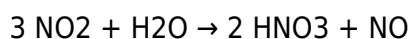
1. Ammonia is oxidized to nitrogen monoxide (NO):
