WHAT IS HYBRIDIZATION?

- **SP³ Hybridization:** This type occurs when one s orbital and three p orbitals hybridize to form four equivalent sp³ hybrid orbitals. Molecules with sp³ hybridization have a tetrahedral shape with bond angles of approximately 109.5 degrees. An example is methane (CH₄).
- **SP³d Hybridization:** In this case, one s orbital, three p orbitals, and one d orbital combine to create five hybrid orbitals. Molecules exhibiting sp³d hybridization tend to have a trigonal bipyramidal shape with bond angles of 90 and 120 degrees. An example is phosphorus pentachloride (PCl₅).
- **SP³d² Hybridization:** This occurs when one s orbital, three p orbitals, and two d orbitals hybridize to form six sp³d² hybrid orbitals, resulting in an octahedral geometry with bond angles of 90 degrees. An example is sulfur hexafluoride (SF₆).

Understanding these types of hybridization is critical for predicting molecular shapes and bonding patterns in various chemical compounds. Each type of hybridization affects the physical and chemical properties of the molecules formed, highlighting the importance of this concept in AP chemistry.

Importance of Hybridization in Molecular Geometry

Hybridization and Bond Angles

Bond angles are an integral part of understanding molecular geometry, and they are directly influenced by the type of hybridization occurring in a molecule. Each type of hybridization is associated with specific bond angles that reflect the spatial arrangement of the hybrid orbitals.

- In sp hybridization, the bond angle is 180 degrees, as seen in diatomic molecules like acetylene.

- In sp³d hybridization, the bond angles are 90 degrees and 120 degrees, found in trigonal bipyramidal molecules like phosphorus pentachloride.

- In sp^3d^2 hybridization, the bond angle is 90° degrees, seen in octahedral molecules like sulfur hexafluoride.

These bond angles result from the repulsion between electron pairs surrounding the central atom, which is a fundamental concept in VSEPR (Valence Shell Electron Pair Repulsion) theory. The relationship between hybridization and bond angles is essential for predicting how molecules will interact and react in various chemical environments.
