

KINETIC EQUATION CHEMISTRY

- $\text{RATE} = -\frac{d[A]}{dt}$ (FOR REACTANTS)
- $\text{RATE} = \frac{d[P]}{dt}$ (FOR PRODUCTS)

WHERE $[A]$ IS THE CONCENTRATION OF THE REACTANT AND $[P]$ IS THE CONCENTRATION OF THE PRODUCT. THE NEGATIVE SIGN INDICATES THAT THE CONCENTRATION OF REACTANTS DECREASES AS THE REACTION PROCEEDS.

TYPES OF KINETIC EQUATIONS

KINETIC EQUATIONS CAN BE CLASSIFIED INTO SEVERAL TYPES BASED ON THE ORDER OF THE REACTION AND THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE RATE AND REACTANT CONCENTRATIONS. THE MOST COMMON TYPES INCLUDE:

- **SECOND-ORDER REACTIONS:** THE RATE DEPENDS ON THE SQUARE OF THE CONCENTRATION OF ONE REACTANT OR THE PRODUCT OF THE CONCENTRATIONS OF TWO REACTANTS. THE EQUATIONS CAN BE $\text{RATE} = k[A]^2$ OR $\text{RATE} = k[A][B]$.
- **MIXED-ORDER REACTIONS:** THESE REACTIONS CAN EXHIBIT CHARACTERISTICS OF DIFFERENT ORDERS DEPENDING ON THE CONCENTRATION OF REACTANTS.

EACH OF THESE TYPES OF KINETIC EQUATIONS PROVIDES UNIQUE INSIGHTS INTO THE MECHANISMS OF CHEMICAL REACTIONS AND ALLOWS CHEMISTS TO TAILOR CONDITIONS FOR OPTIMAL OUTCOMES.

MATHEMATICAL DERIVATION OF KINETIC EQUATIONS

$$-\text{RATE} = k[A]$$

UPON INTEGRATING THIS EQUATION, WE OBTAIN:

$$-\ln[A] = -kt + \ln[A]_0$$

WHERE $[A]_0$ IS THE INITIAL CONCENTRATION OF THE REACTANT. THIS EQUATION DEMONSTRATES HOW THE CONCENTRATION OF A REACTANT DECREASES EXPONENTIALLY OVER TIME, WHICH IS CHARACTERISTIC OF FIRST-ORDER KINETICS.

FOR HIGHER-ORDER REACTIONS, THE INTEGRATION PROCESS BECOMES MORE COMPLEX, OFTEN REQUIRING THE USE OF SPECIFIC TECHNIQUES OR NUMERICAL METHODS TO SOLVE. NONETHELESS, THE FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES REMAIN ROOTED IN THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN REACTANT CONCENTRATIONS AND THE RATE OF REACTION.

FACTORS AFFECTING REACTION RATES

REACTION RATES.
