- IF THE REACTION IS $A + B \rightarrow C$, AND "n" MOLES OF A REACT WITH "n" MOLES OF B, THEN THE NUMBER OF MOLES OF C PRODUCED CAN ALSO BE EXPRESSED IN TERMS OF "n".
- FOR INSTANCE, IF THE COEFFICIENTS ARE 1:1:1, THEN "n" MOLES OF A PRODUCE "n" MOLES OF C.

"n" IN MOLECULAR STRUCTURES

IN ADDITION TO ITS ROLE IN STOICHIOMETRY, "n" IS SIGNIFICANT IN REPRESENTING MOLECULAR STRUCTURES, PARTICULARLY IN ORGANIC CHEMISTRY. IT IS OFTEN USED TO DENOTE THE NUMBER OF CARBON ATOMS IN A HYDROCARBON CHAIN OR THE NUMBER OF REPEATING UNITS IN A POLYMER.
