DEFINITION OF TDS

TOTAL DISSOLVED SOLIDS (TDS) IS DEFINED AS THE TOTAL CONCENTRATION OF DISSOLVED SUBSTANCES IN A LIQUID. THIS INCLUDES A WIDE RANGE OF MATERIALS SUCH AS SALTS, MINERALS, AND ORGANIC MATTER. TDS IS TYPICALLY EXPRESSED IN MILLIGRAMS PER LITER (MG/L) OR PARTS PER MILLION (PPM). THE SUBSTANCES THAT CONTRIBUTE TO TDS CAN BE CATEGORIZED INTO TWO GROUPS: CATIONS (POSITIVELY CHARGED IONS LIKE SODIUM, CALCIUM, AND MAGNESIUM) AND ANIONS (NEGATIVELY CHARGED IONS LIKE CHLORIDE, SULFATE, AND BICARBONATE). UNDERSTANDING THE COMPOSITION OF TDS IS ESSENTIAL FOR EVALUATING WATER QUALITY AND ITS SUITABILITY FOR VARIOUS USES.

IN CHEMISTRY, TDS IS SIGNIFICANT BECAUSE IT INFLUENCES THE PHYSICAL AND CHEMICAL PROPERTIES OF WATER. FOR EXAMPLE, HIGHER TDS LEVELS CAN ALTER THE CONDUCTIVITY, pH, AND TURBIDITY OF WATER. THESE CHANGES CAN HAVE PROFOUND EFFECTS ON AQUATIC LIFE AND THE USABILITY OF WATER IN VARIOUS INDUSTRIAL PROCESSES.

IMPORTANCE OF TDS CHEMISTRY

METHODS OF MEASURING TDS

- **FILTRATION AND DRYING:** SIMILAR TO GRAVIMETRIC ANALYSIS, THIS METHOD INVOLVES FILTERING THE SAMPLE AND DRYING THE RESIDUE TO QUANTIFY THE DISSOLVED SOLIDS.
- **MEMBRANE FILTRATION:** THIS TECHNIQUE USES MEMBRANES TO SEPARATE DISSOLVED SOLIDS FROM WATER, ALLOWING FOR PRECISE MEASUREMENT OF TDS.

EACH OF THESE METHODS CAN PROVIDE VALUABLE INSIGHTS INTO TDS LEVELS, AND THE CHOICE OF METHOD OFTEN DEPENDS ON THE SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS OF THE STUDY OR ANALYSIS BEING CONDUCTED.

FACTORS AFFECTING TDS LEVELS
