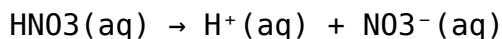

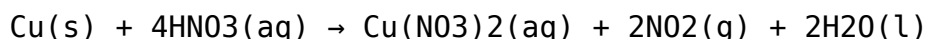
Acidic Nature

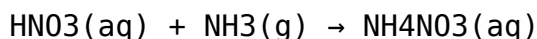
